

Keith's Travel Blog - Thailand

A three centre discovery tour of Thailand, with varied scenery, colourful happy people who are very loyal to the monarch, play the national anthem at a railway station and every one stands reverently.

We put our own tour together and asked Kuoni to arrange it all, it proved both informative and relaxing.

Thai Airways 12 hour flight to Bangkok and transfer to a Sheraton Hotel, views from 21st floor, on the banks of the river Chao Phraya. Being here we were able to take a river dinner cruise next door with Radio City nearby. A good meal, we are not normally adventurous in our eating habits!

From our point of view this location was central enough and enabled us to see most of the main sites on foot, or Skytrain. The Royal Palace, one of the largest gold buddha statues, Wat Pho temple, Monica her first massage here, local market, Chinatown, floating markets, a lot to see. On one occasion we did venture into a taxi in the attempts to find one who used a meter, hairy, had been given a price by the doorman, when driver asked for more, advised him of this and he gave way. Not so on return, so we refused to leave until correct change given, he had to go find! Teach us to try view red light district. In four days we saw what we had planned.

On to Chiang Mai in the north, really odd aircraft, Boeing 717 with three and two seating, took about ninety minutes and taxi to the Hotel Empress.it looked a bit run down, traditional, but interior sufficed. Here walking was the main way again, markets, street massages and temples where very young boys are being trained in Buddhism, but unlike some we have seen, very clean. One of these Temples even had a notice telling visitors to use the supplied slippers for trips to the loo!

Decided to buy a mini bus trip into the interior, more mountainous and with a more Thai feeling. Busy day, Elephant camp, where they actually paint with their trunks, river walk on Elephant and half hour raft trip . Next day, mini bus tour went to highest point Doi Inthanon and on to the future burial site built for the King, he has since been brought there. Return journey was by Sawthong ? sitting sideways to the road on a cart /taxi.




Wat Phra That Doi Suthep where you need toilet slippers!

Then south to Koh Samui for the relaxing bit, on the beach Amari Palm Reef Hotel, twelve pillows each on the bed and golf buggy to our room, was just the location, for a few rays (beach chairs) and proximity of restaurants and town. Even a place with sawdust floor and tables made from packing crates, actually very good food also and cheap. The only excursion was to Ang Thong. A series of beautiful islands, seen properly after a short climb, but with the most talcum powder of sands. all set in a very blue sea. One evening, like them or not, happened to walk past outside a Ladyboy show, Monica was impressed at the clothes and make up they had on, but did not see the show.

The return journey to Bangkok was on a propeller plane covered with cartoon palms trees. The Called itself a boutique airline! Twelve hour night flight back to Heathrow.

Memory Worship ~ Who is it for?

Memory Worship was created with the vision of finding a space where people with or without dementia (often carers), could approach God, worship and feel God's caring presence together.

Worship can be a channel for recalling the past, creating feelings of comfort, familiarity and spiritual fulfilment. We all have continuing need to worship and experience a loving encounter with God.

The informal, structured part of the service lasts thirty minutes before leading into a craft activity and hospitality (tea and biscuits). Everyone has opportunity to connect with their own creativity by participating with our volunteers.

After each service, carers can chat with other people in a similar situation and with our volunteer team.

Leigh Old Town Cash Injection to Safeguard Port

A HUGE £14.8 million cash injection is set to boost the cockling industry and safeguard a south Essex port for future generations. Southend Council plans to use Levelling Up funding from the government to rejuvenate Leigh Old Town, by revamping the quay and opening up improved access for fishing boats at the port. As part of the works, the quay will be resurfaced, the wall will be replaced, and the entrance will be widened for better vehicle access. It is hoped this will also reduce the risk of flooding for residents.

Meanwhile, a second project will see silt removed from a three-kilometre stretch of water to improve access for boats and hopefully boost the fishing industry. Fisherman and Leigh town councillor Paul Gilson stressed the importance of removing the silt soon. He said: "Unless we take urgent action, Leigh Creek will silt up to a muddy puddle." Along with our cockle fishery, all being well, we should have two new clam fisheries which will want more space. That means more jobs should be created.

Sale of Southend United Football Club

THE new owners of Southend United will have to wait until about April as Southend Council and Ron Martin attempt to sign-off on a deal to allow the takeover to be completed. In December, Southend United confirmed that contracts were exchanged between former chairman Ron Martin and the consortium set to take control of the Shrimpers - led by Justin Rees. However, the deal relies upon Southend Council agreeing terms with Mr Martin for the 500 homes proposed for the Roots Hall stadium to be moved to the Fossetts Farm site increasing it to 1,400 homes. In the meantime the club has been left in limbo as the consortium wait to officially take control of the club.

The council said "There were draft terms agreed subject to due diligence which allowed the sale of the club to complete on December 23. In January, it was the scope of works in terms of what the due diligence would look like, because we had to go out and get those prices and costs of everything. We know how important it is and the urgency of it, but by all accounts the last of Fossetts took over a year to do all the due diligence so we are doing it at speed."

TV Show - Come Dine With Me

Three local businesses will feature in a special vegan-themed episode on 'Come Dine With Me: The Professionals' - channel 4 on 25th April. The Oak Tree restaurant, Leigh Road and Stoked Vegan BBQ, London Rd, Westcliff were used as locations to host episodes whilst the Royal Hotel in Southend was used for the interview scenes.

Southend Hospital Extension Project

AN £8million expansion to modernise Southend Hospital's A&E department, improve care and slash waiting lists has been given the green light. The major work will see a two-storey extension between the Prittlewell building and the main emergency department which will increase capacity and improve patient waiting times. The start date for work to commence is unconfirmed, however in planning documents the hospital has stated it is hoping to begin later this year.

Alongside an extension, the ambitious project at Southend involves a new paediatric entrance, new emergency department entrance, improvements to ambulance parking with additional bays, new disabled parking bays, adjustments to existing car park layout and landscaping works.

Southend Threat of Flooding Plans

Southend's City Beach could be transformed into a green oasis with a "mini stream" and special gardens that collect, treat, store, and use rainwater under £2m plans to brighten up Golden mile and also includes building places where extra water can be safely stored during big storms, to prevent flooding. Southend Council has secured more than £2 million of external funding to support the project. This includes £764,290 from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, £500,000 from Anglian Water and £800,000 from the Regional Flood and Coastal Committee.
